

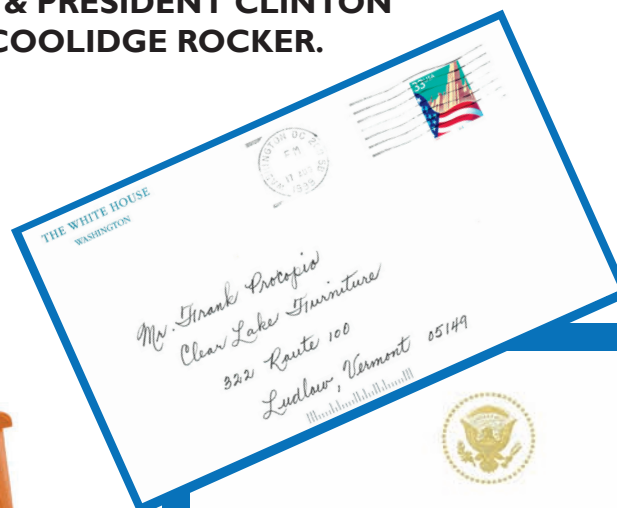


Three rockers welcome passersby on the front porch of the President Calvin Coolidge summer White House in Plymouth Notch, Vermont.

WHITE HOUSE & PRESIDENT CLINTON  
RECEIVES COOLIDGE ROCKER.**



At 2:47a.m. on August 3, 1923, Calvin Coolidge took the oath of office at his home in Plymouth, Vermont, to become the 30<sup>th</sup> President of the United States. In spite of his position as leader of the nation, Coolidge could still be seen sitting in his rocking chair on the front porch of his family's homestead. From this perch, he welcomed passersby and chatted amiably about the topics of the day. Seventy-five years later, there are still three rocking chairs on the porch of the Coolidge homestead, one of which is believed to be crafted by the President himself. In honor of the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Homestead Inaugural, ClearLake Furniture created the Coolidge Rocker.
